

On November 5, 1938, the W.P.A. enrollment stood at 3,262,000 persons.

On February 11, 1939, W.P.A. Administrator Harrington announced that the relief enrollment had gone down to 2,985,881.

In three months, more than a quarter of million persons have been thrown off the rolls-and into utter misery.

That's the first result of the Billion-Dollar relief cut of Roosevelt and Congress.

A week ago, Congressman Dudley A. White of Ohio, speaking at the Hotel Pennsylvania in New York, said that the Congressional Relief Bill reduction was "an experiment to see whether relief expenditures could not be cut down somewhat as economic recovery progressed."

When you experiment with cutting up guinea pigs-it doesn't matter much. If the pigs die, you can get millions more cheap.

But the millions of unemployed and their families are not guinea pigs you can experiment with, or cut up, and leave to die!

Long notorious for anti-labor brutality and frame-ups, this last attack upon a picket line by the Oakland police force has brought fresh realization to the labor movement that Workers Defense Guards must be formed if so much as the elementary right to picket is to be safeguarded.

Funds are being rushed to the Defense Committee as the first step in the fight to save the picketers.

FAR EAST CRISIS PUSHES WORLD CLOSER TO WAR

European Diplomats in Wrangle Over Spain Pickings

WAR FUNDS JUMP

The long-awaited Spring war risis is developing swiftly both in Europe and in the Far East.

On Thursday Japan served a thinly-veiled ultimatum on the Soviet Government over the Siberian fisheries. But it is precisely upon this issue that Japan is preparing a fresh test of strength between itself and the Soviet Linion and for this purpose has mobilized troops along the Siberian frontier and warships near Sakhalin, opposite Vladivostok.

In Europe the final stages of the strangulation of the Spanish revolution are paving the way for the resumption of the military and diplomatic see-saw between the London-Paris and Rome-Berlin axes which will have to end either in another Munich conference or this time in war. Mussolini was expected to for mulate openly his Mediterranean demands this week. In anticipation of these demands both the British and French governments have been tumbling all over themselves to secure footholds in Franco's capital, to speed up the final abdication of the Loyalist government, and to wean Franco way from his German and Italan mentors.

British Head Jobless for Compulsory Labor Camps

The British government is preparing to herd the jobless millions LIBERTIES REPORT Britain into compulsory labor camps just like those in Nazi Britain into compulsory labor camps just like those in Nazi Jermany.

Parliament opened debate in London this week on proposals designed to set up a compulsory labor service as a means of priming the unemployed workers for service in the army.

Prominent Conservatives in Parliament have come forward openly with the proposals that the government does not yet dare sponsor. These conservatives, led by Sir Percy Hurd, speak with shameless cynicism of utilizing skillful propaganda and a proper amount of "persuasion" to lure the young workers into the armed forces. The next step would be enforced conscription.

These proposals are similar to those in such American news papers as the Daily News which advocates the complete militarization of C.C.C. camps in the United States.

At the same time, the plans for converting England, Scotland, and Wales into twelve regions ruled by twelve absolute dictators upon the declaration of war pro-

Arms Increase

In hopes of either extracting a better bargain this time-or of eing better prepared if an armed howdown proves unavoidable-Great Britain has stepped up its arms outlay for this year alone to £580,000,000 (\$2,900,000,000) and has increased its borrowing plans from \$2,000,000,000 to \$4,000,000,000 to complete the five-year arms program due for completion in 1942. This includes provision for in capital ships larger than those of Germany, Italy, and Japan combined.

In Washington this week Congress voted \$376,000,000 to add 3,000 fighting planes to the Army Air Corps, making a total of 5,500 planes. SOCIALIST APPAX

The trouble with lying is that, as Gainsborough remarked of Mrs. Siddon's nose, there's no end to it. What begins as a simple, unassuming frame-up is likely to end up by requiring a wholesale revision of history and art. Having successfully used the Moscow trials to destroy all potential leaders of an opposition, the Kremlin now finds itself committed to the extraordinary thesis that all the great leaders of 1917, except Lenin and Stalin, were even then traitors and spies. This campaign of falsification, probably the most ambitious in all history, has corrupted every sphere of Soviet life. The cinema, above all has been pressed into service to document the trials in celluloid. A year ago the first of such films, Lenin in October, arrived over here. And now two more are being shown in the little cinemas: Ermler's The Great Citizen and Yutkevitch's The Man With the Gun. These are two of the leading directors in the so-called "Stalin School" which has come to dominate the Soviet cinema in recent years. In 1932 they worked together on Counterplan, a monumentally dull and now forgotten film which was the first major effort to introduce "Socialist Realism" into the cinema. There is no point in analyzing their films from a cinematic point of view: there is nothing in either of them that will get their creators into trouble with the authorities, which is to say they are the tamest, flattest, most banal sort of Hollywood realism. But they are more interesting from a political standpoint.

Down with Tractors!

Ermler's film shows us the struggle of "The Great Citizen"-evidently intended to be Kirovagainst a sinister clique of saboteurs, evidently meant to represent the Bukharinist right-wing opposition to the first Five Year Plan. The plots and counterplots revolve around what would seem to be a simple enough question: whether it was desirable that the level of production should be raised. The Great Citizen takes a firm stand for industrialization, and also comes out strongly in favor of more tractors. The Bukharinists, motivated by that paranoiacal malignancy which seems to afflict the opponents of Stalin, try to persuade the workers that tractors are evil and industrialization a curse. It is never made clear why they take this position, nor, for that matter, why they are willing to gamble, and as it chances to lose, their high governmental posts in this campaign for a lower productive level. It seems to be a matter of art for art's sake.

Everything comes to a head in a mass meeting, at which the Bukharinists are sandbagged with everything from mother love to the theory of socialism in one country, and are finally driven from the platform in deep and well-merited disgrace. After that, there is only one course left. The film ends with their first meeting with the emissary of an unnamed foreign power. As they plot, loud bursts of band music come in the windows from a passing demonstration of workers (who are celebrating the birth of a tractor), drowning out their talk. This is supposed to symbolize the ultimate triumph of the healthy masses. But I could not but remember that this music, the cheapest sort of Sousa brass band stuff, was advertised as by Dimitri Shostakovitch, the once-brilliant young composer who was admonished by Stalin several years ago to "write tunes the workers can whistle." Those Men Are Here Again

In Yutkevitch's The Man With the Gun we see once more those twin demigods, Lenin and Stalin, pulling off the 1917 revolution practically single-handed. Their first appearance was in Lenin in October. Here once more, they steer the revolution to safe harbor in the teeth of treacherous opposition from their closest collaborators. "Never mind Zinoviev and Kamenev," Lenin tells Stalin on the phone. "They are fleas which will always irritate us." (He fails to explain why he didn't crush these "fleas" then and there.) He takes Trotsky more seriously, however. "Keep a close watch on Trotsky!" he counsels Stalin. But later on it appears that Trotsky has escaped from his keepers long enough to see to it that the wrong calibre shells are sent to a crucial sector of the battle front. When the news is brought to Lenin, he makes it clear that he suspects the fine Italian hand of the commander-inchief of his army. Stalin bustles off to repair the damage at once.

By now such films have worked out a formula for portraying Lenin. On the one hand, he is shown as a simple, homey sort of old fellow--in the memorable phrase of Robert Forsythe in the New Masses: "a man who might easily have played third base for the Brooklyn Dodgers." He is constantly slapping people (usually Stalin) on the back, sharing their joys and sorrows, munching apples or cold boiled potatoes in democratic fashion, and otherwise demonstrating that he's a regular fellow. But this unprepossessing old gentleman has the most extraordinary effect on all who come into contact with him. Their awe and reverence approaches the mystical; their faith in him is the complete, touching faith of little children. When the simple soldier who is the hero of The Man With the Gun learns that he has been talking, quite unsuspecting, to Lenin, he rushes back to his comrades, assembles them around him and stammers out, "I have just talked to LENIN!" Quick fadeout on his crazed, ecstatic face. Later on, he persuades a whole company of enemy soldiers to join the Reds simply by telling them he has talked to Lenin and that Lenin is O.K. and has their interests at heart. Thus on the one hand, Lenin is made human, all too human-to the point of vulgarization; and on the other, he is elevated to a living ikon, a leader whose mere presence, whose very name indeed, has magical powers. Both sides of the contradiction serve well the interests of the Kremlin today.

Uncomfortable Posts

I don't envy the actors who have to play "Lenin" and "Stalin" in these tableaux. In this film, both parts are taken by different performers from those who played in Lenin in October. This Lenin is Comrade Shtraukh (Honored Artist of the Republic), and he has evidently taken to heart Krupskava's criticism of his predecessor's ever-expansive gesturing. He seems none too easy in his part. Nor does Comrade Gelovani, who plays Stalin, seem to be having a good time. These are posts uncomfortably close to the lightning. What has happened to Comrade Gelovani's predecessor I do not know, but the Times recently reported that Comrade Schushkin, who played 'Lenin" in the earlier film, has been placed under arrest. Perhaps he took a Leninist line off as well as on the stage.





the mantle of Abraham Lincoln. Herbert claims the mantle. We are not concerned about who wins this squabble over the mantle. Neither Franklin nor Herbert look much like the giant rail-splitter.

Yet it would be completely unrealistic not to see that unless a third alternative is presented before 1940, the Republican party, no doubt with a stream-lined New Dealer to replace Hoover, will stand good chances of winning the election.

The dissatisfaction of the workers and farmers expressed itself at the last election with substantial Republican victories. And Bill Green's criticisms of the New Deal fit nicely into that pattern.

So long as the people are presented with only two parties to choose from, the pendulum will shift further and further to the right.

Only a party that is really the workers' own can hope to break through this combination. The first step on the road to ending all capitalist politics whether of the Hoover, Roosevelt, or Daily Worker variety is the formation of a Labor Party.

The giant flying fortresses recently seen in Minneapolis "can perform feats unequalled by any other plane in the world," i.e., kill more damned workers per square yard than any other kind of plane.


Lincoln's birthday was the memorial occasion for Herbert's last appearance in the capitalist press. He gave a long speech accusing Franklin D. of usurping

But why doesn't this British patriot and banker advocate at least that economic embargo against Japan which, we are assured by the Champions of Democracy, would bring the Aggressor to his knees without resorting to war? The Post story explains that, too:

"Japan doesn't want to declare war on China, he explained, because that would bring down the American embargo on exports. Seventy percent of the essential materials for war that Japan must import have been coming from us, Great Britain and France-not the dictator nations.

"He admitted that if the democratic Powers clamped an economic embargo on Japan they could stop the undeclared war in China. However, this probably would bring on a Japanese economic collapse and that would likely bring Communism to Japan."
