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WORKERS CAN DEFEAT HITLER They Can End the Threat of Fascism By Crushing the Capitalist System **Nazis Established**

Every worker in this country and in other countries, where fascism has not yet succeeded in destroying every bit of freedom possessed by the working class, is anxions to stop Hitler at all costs. That is as it should be. There is nothing more urgent at the present moment than to stop Hitler.

But the all-important question remains: How can the workers stop Hitler? The workers must be absolutely clear about the answer to this question. Otherwise, they will struggle in vain and like tens of thousands of Austrian and Spanish workers they will sacrifice their lives without accomplishing their purpose.

To struggle to the death against fascism is absolutely necessary. But we must win in that struggle.

Chamberlain, the prime minister of England, Daladier the premier of France and President Roosevelt are threatening to fight and stop Hitler. Should not, then, the workers back the heads of these "democratic" governments and try to stop Hitler in that way?

That is what the Stalinists and socialdemocrats, the liberals and conservative trade union leaders advise us to do.

THAT WAY LIES FASCISM

We can say with absolute certainty that if the workers follow such advice, they are doomed. Like their brothers in Austria and Spain they will sacrifice their lives in vain.

In any war by the democratic capitalist countries against Germany, Hitler might be defeated and stopped. But Hitlerism, fascism, will remain, will become the prevailing system in the democratic countries as a result of the war.

If Roosevelt is so pugnacious against Hitler it is not because Hitler has made virtual slaves out of the German workers, but because Germany threatens to take away much of the South American trade which is now in the possession of American capitalists.

The democratic capitalist governments are interested in fighting Hitler only to protect their right to rob and exploit the colonial and semi-colonial slaves and the workers in the home countries.

It is not worth a single drop of the blood of any worker to stop Hitler for the benefit of the capitalists in the "democratic" countries. It is worth everything to destroy Hitlerism throughout the world.

The workers can stop Hitler in only one way. They must begin the job in their

own country by destroying the capitalist system and they will then find it easy to get rid of Hitler in Germany.

Let the workers take over power in England, in France and in this country. Let them abolish the capitalist system which is the mother of all fascist movements. Let them establish a Workers' Government which will give the factories to the workers and the land to the working farmers. Under such a government the great masses of the people will fight Hitler and Hitlerism to the bitter end.

And a Workers' Government will call upon the German workers to revolt against Hitler and the German workers can be counted on to answer such a call without hesitation.

At present Hitler can tell the German workers that England, France and the United States are preparing for war against Germany because the capitalists of those countries want to enslave the German people. And the German workers can readily see that Chamberlain and Daladier are not fighting for democracy.

THE ONLY WAY OUT

But when the German workers will see that the workers of England, France and the United States have thrown the capitalists out of power it will be impossible for Hitler to fool them. They will do to Hitler and to the German capitalists what the workers of France, England and the United States did to their capitalists.

This is the hard way but it is the only way out for the workers of the world. There is no other way to stop Hitler and Hitlerism.

On Soviet Border Pact With Rumania Gives Hitler New

Outpost; Stalin Still Playing For Deal With Reich

U.S.S.R. IN PERILOUS SPOT

By establishing German economic domination over Rumania, Adolf Hitler last week had virtually planted his pirate flag on the borders of the Soviet Union.

Hitler, gobbling up Memel in his stride, forced Rumania to sign an agreement which virtually establishes full German control over Rumania's rich resources, yoking them to German needs and placing the whole of Rumanian economy in subordination to the Greater Reich.

The hesitation and uncertainty that existed earlier in the week over the precise status of this German-Rumanian agreement apparently arose out of the Rumanian government's uncertainty as to the course British and French imperialism would pursue.

There appeared every reason to believe that Rumania waited to see if it could count on British, French, or Russian aid and when it aw that no such aid would be forthcoming, it signed on the dotted

The surrender of central Spain to Franco is practically arranged, and former Premier Negrin is working closely to this end with the Madrid Junta's Paris representative, according to a dispatch from Paris to La Voz, Spanish-language Popular Frontist daily in New York, March 23.

On the 22nd, conversations between the Junta and Burgos had been proceeding for three days, according to Trifon Gomez, Spanish Socialist leader and Paris representative of the Junta.

"Everything will be concluded favorably," he said. "for I do not expect differences to arise which will oblige us to suspend negotiations." The main point being worked out is evacuation from Spain of the Popular Front leadership.

"Naturally we are trying to evacuate only those persons who have been included by Burgos among those guilty under the Law of Responsibilities, and not those who may have committed common crimes, with whom we have no solidarity whatsoever. All compromised Spaniards will depart by agreement with the Junta and with Burgos' wishes.'







The Wallace Plan

Several months ago, in my New International column, I quoted a Washington "confidential News Letter" on an embryonic New Deal scheme. "Idea," ran the report, "is to find ways of enabling more people to eat more food. . . . It appears to be a fact that 1-3 of our people, perhaps even 1/2, don't get enough to eat. . . So, step up consumption, eat up surpluses, thus aid farmers. That's the basis idea. How? One way might be by socialism or communism. Another way is by improving existing distribution methods WITHIN the profit system." What interested me at the time was the frank admission that (1) the American masses don't get enough to eat under capitalism; and (2) communism would mean, for them, more food. But now the "other" way, WITHIN the profit system, has materialized. It makes a neat rounding out of the story. The alternative to communism turns out to be Secretary Wallace's ingenious orange and blue food card system, which was lately saluted in an Appeal editorial. On the surface, the Wallace Plan is designed actually to give the unemployed, in this seventh year of the New Deal, enough to eat. General Hugh Johnson, an admirer of the Wallace Plan, admitted recently in his daily column: "Government studies of W.P.A. wages have shown that, while the amount available for food for a family of four, for example, is enough to prevent starvation Who says democracy doesn't work?-D.M.] it is not enough to provide a minimum balanced diet, especially for children, in some of the foods of which there is a surplus-dairy products, eggs, fruit and vegetables." (And let it not be forgotten that W.P.A. wages, just above the starvation level, are much higher than home and local relief.)

For their above-starvation foodstuffs, the unemployed have had to depend on the erratic bounty of the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation, which buys up big lots of surplus farm products and gives them to the unemployed. The system is designed to stabilize farm markets rather than to meet human needs, and so the unemployed function as a sort of refuse dump for whatever our insane economic system overproduces at any given moment.

The Wallace Plan continues to use the unemployed as a dump for surplus farm products. But instead of the Government giving the food direct to the reliefers, it gives them blue cards. which are exchangeable at their grocers for whatever foodstuffs are officially designated "surplus" that week. The beauty of this new arrangement is that every one-except, of course, the ultimate consumer-gets his cut of profit, from wholesaler to retailer.

Nor is this all. Secretary Wallace has decided that the unemployed cannot be trusted to spend their nickels wisely, and so he also proposes that the amount of each relief check which he and the other New Deal supermen in their all-wisdom decide should be spent for food-that this amount be paid not in cash but in orange tick-

ets. Like the blue tickets-which apply only to surplus commodities- these will be redeemable in any store for food. The same Washington News Letter from which I originally quoted, in a later issue revealed that the Wallace Plan will be tried out first in a few selected cities and then, if it works, will be extended everywhere. "Clothing and other necessities are not included in the plan now, but it is freely said they may be added later, IF the plan works on food." I hope the unemployed workers of the country will show by demonstrations and by other suitable action that the Wallace Plan doesn't "work," that they are still adult enough to buy their own shoes and hats and food even if this cockeyed economic system prevents them from working productively. For their banners, I suggest two inscriptions: "Mother DOESN'T Know Best!" And this sentence from the Washington Letter: "Purpose of Plan is primarily farm relief, secondarily human relief."

A Luxemburgite Objects

Some one who wants to remain anonymous writes in to endorse, on the whole, my recent remarks in this column on the S.W.P.'s handling of the Anti-Bund demonstration outside Madison Square Garden. But he also adds: "I wish to register, as a Luxemburgite, that the comparison with Fascist showmanship goes a bit too far, because there are limits to left showmanship that do not restrict fascism. These limits relate to the degree to which a genuine social revolution is in its actual occurrence-as distinguished from demonstrations, meetings, etc .- a self-induced mass act, rather than something, as Rosa said, 'led with a baton.' The fascist coup d'etat is always accomplished under the baton, and this is one of the signs that it is not a social revolution. While the socialist revolution, no matter what role the Party plays as a gear, overflows the rim of the ordered and assumes a ragged, uneven character-with even the most conscious elements running around wild and improvising. And this has to be prepared for, too.

"So, while I agree with your general criticism, I suggest you add to it the thought that if all the Party members had been on their toes, thinking of the total effect of their act, they would, even without preliminary preparation, which would have been preferable, have thought of various improvised means for letting the crowds know about the S.W.P., the Appeal, etc. In short. I just want to strike one note for the individual side, along with your chord on the organizational. Both ought to develop together. Of course, this is a big subject, and I'm just poking around in it here."

But I'd like to ask my Luxemburgian lover of spontaneity-and I'm all with him there, myself -just how the demonstrators, on their toes or not, could have improvised banners and placards out of thin air, or could have conjured up copies of the Appeal when none were sent from headquarters?



(June 5, 1870-executed May 12, 1916) The newspapers report the resurgence of the Irish independence movement. "Up the Rebels," is again heard in the streets of Dublin-this time directed against a one-time rebel, Eamon De Valera, as well as the British tyrants. The anniversary of Red Easter Week is only a few weeks away.

Jim Connolly was once asked at a lecture how it was that he knew so much about revolutionary and military matters. "You forget," he replied, "that revolution is my business."

And that it was. For though he worked at any number of trades in Ireland and in this country-as baker, shoemaker, tiler, machinist, linotyper, etc .- Jim Connolly was primarily a revolutionist, in the words of his biographer, Desmond Ryan, the "first builder of an insurgent barricade in war-wrecked Europe."

Himself a worker, and the son of a worker, Connolly sought to free the movement for Ireland's freedom from the petty-bourgeois and nationalist elements who dominated it at the time; he viewed with distrust the official nationalist leaders who had, he said, "bowed the knee to Baal."

A student of Marxism, and proud to acknowledge that, he insisted that "only the Irish working class remains as the incorruptible inheritors of the fight for freedom in Ireland." For "As we have again and again pointed out, the Irish question is a social question, the whole agelong fight of the Irish people against their oppressors resolves itself in the last analysis into a fight for the mastery of the means of life, the sources of production." His great book, "Labor in Irish History," is based on that thesis.

Back in the 90's when Connolly first began his socialist work, the nationalist movement was in pretty bad shape. The British, riding the wave of imperialist prosperity, tossed the Irish a few crumbs and devitalized the movement for liberation into a mere plea for Home Rule. (Connolly was especially bitter against the Home Rulers.) Such revolutionary work as was being done, was done secretively. Connolly broke through this "ridiculous secrecy," and brought the socialist movement into the open. In 1896 he founded the Irish Socialist Republican Party, and became editor of its paper, the "Worker's Republic." (The paper bore on its masthead this legend: "The great appear great only because we are on our knees, let us arise!")

Emigrating to the United States in 1903, he immediately enrolled in the trade union and socialist movements of this country. An industrial unionist all his life, he became in America one of the earliest organizers of the I.W.W. For a time he was a member of the National Exec-

the Socialist Labor Party Disagreeing with Daniel De Leon, leader of the S.L.P., over some questions of policy, he joined the newly formed Socialist Party, for which he worked as a national organizer.

England's Crisis- Ireland's Opportunity Returning to Ireland in 1913, he arrived at the very moment when the great strike battle, led by the Irish Transport and General Workers Union, against Dublin's united bosses was getting under way. 20,000 workers fought for six months to assert their right to join a union. Jim Larkin, a striking figure and orator, was the best-known leader of the strike. Connolly worked as Larkin's right-hand man.

Connolly judged crises according to their revolutionary possibilities. In England's war crisis, he saw revolutionary Ireland's opportunity. Realizing that collaboration of all the independence movements was absolutely vital, Connolly united, in preparation for action, the I.T.G.W.U., the Socialists, the Citizen's Army the Sinn Feiners, and the Republican Volunteers

Both sides mobilized. April was stormy with preparations and preliminary skirmishes. Finally, the British moved in to disarm the Volunteers and the Citizen's Army, Connolly, who, as the most popular and undoubtedly most able person, had been appointed Commander-in-Chief of the revolutionary forces, gave the order for the rising on April 23. The petty-bourgeois leaders of the Volunteers rescinded the order, but the rising went on-their cowardice was too late. The "Provisional Government of an Independent Irish Republic" was proclaimed.

By the morning of April 24, virtually every important point of Dublin was in the hands of the rebels, so carefully had Connolly laid his plans. Facing the ruthless bombardment of British artillery which destroyed the center of the city, the rebels nevertheless fought fiercely for a week with inferior weapons. The uprising was crushed, and the democratic British immediately imposed a bloody reign of White Terror.

Ours ... Fighting and Hoping

The moment may not have been fully ripe for revolutionary action. But the valiant action led by Connolly was by no means an ill-considered, valueless stroke. Like the Russian 1905, it was a preliminary battle, preparatory to the final struggle. Weak-kneed traitors, and "I-Told-You-So" cowards can dismiss Red Easter as an adventuristic putsch; but in the words of Lenin, "those who can term such a rising a putsch are either the worst kind of reactionaries or hopeless doctrinaires, incapable of imagining the social revolution as a living phenomenon."

Connolly was held prisoner in Kilmainham Jail (Eamon De Valera was privileged to be there with him). On May 12, wounded, carried out on a chair, "fighting and hoping" (he always ended his letters thus), courageous beyond flinching, he faced a British firing squad.

Billions For Gunpowder

It is impossible for anyone to estimate at the present time the eventual amounts which Congress will divert from the pockets of the unemployed to the war machine. Conservative commentators in Washington believe that before the present Congress adjourns it will go down in history not as the "Economy" Congress which it would like to call itself, but the "National Defense" (Imperialist War) Con-

They predict that authorizations for direct expenditures on war planes, battleships, submarines, long range guns and other instruments for the destruction of human life may reach \$3,000,000,000 for this session-with appropriations for indirect expenditures bringing the total to not less than \$4,000,000,000.

Hearings began this week, for instance, in a House committee upon one appropriation, the proposed naval budget, which alone, not considering other appropriations for the army, the air force, spies, secret diplomatic maneuvers, will amount to \$755,000,000. That is \$50,000,000 more than Congress has allowed for all the unemployed in the United States. And there is absolutely no indication whatsoever that the least cut will be made in this request for war funds.

Not since the last World War has any Congress dumped such vast sums of money down the gullet of ment granting the 6-hour day, walked off all jobs in their territory operated by the Master Plumbers of the Bronx and Manhattan. All plumbing work on new construction is tied up tight in Manhattan and the Bronx. Work at the World's Fair is at a standstill. The

Plumbers are in an excellent position to win all their demands. But they must keep a watchful eye on the International officers and guard against any attempt to arbitrate away the six hour day.

Encouraging indeed to labor everywhere is the whole-hearted support accorded the striking plumbers and helpers by Local No. 3 International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. This local which has already won the 6-hour day is engaged in a big campaign to spread the fight. They have issued buttons, leaflets, stickers and sent out speakers to other locals. Their slogan is "The 30-hour Week-A Practical Solution for Unemployment."

The example shown by the Plumbers and Electrical workers must be followed by unions everywhere. With the same spirit and determination which the trade unions of America started the fight for the 8-hour day 53 years ago, organized labor must today take up the fight for the six-hour day and the 5-day week.

Division in labor's ranks is an obstacle to that fight. For a United Labor Movement! Against unemployment and starvation!

Forward to the 30-hour week! Hail the fighting ranks of Local No. 463!

The Uses Of Terrorism

In a report just made public, the Senate Civil Liberties Committee reveals a picture of terrorism and violence in industrial warfare that should confound once and for all the assertions of apologists for capitalism that in America there are no classes and that the American way is the democratic and peaceful way.

We refer to the planned, deliberate, premeditated use of terrorism and violence by employers in the United States. We refer to their conscious, calculated purchase of revolvers, shot guns, rifles, gas guns, ammunition, and hand grenades with which they plan long in advance to spill the blood of the human beings who work under their domination.

The arming of the capitalist class is not just an isolated racket that can be stamped out with a few well meaning laws. Capitalists laugh at such laws. The use of arms, private thugs, organized murder, terrorism and violence forms the core of their strategy in maintaining their stream of super-profits.

The war for a peaceful system of life does not lie in the direction pointed out by Roosevelt. It is right here at home. And the enemy has been listed by name and individual corporation in the report of the Civil Liberties Committee.

Stalinists Hurt C.I.O.

Following in close succession, two unions have quit the C.I.O. in protest against union-wrecking Stalinist leadership. First, the Executive Committee of the Southern Tenant Farmer's Union ordered all its locals to withdraw from the United Cannery Workers, a C.I.O. affiliate, after a referendum among its membership. Then, 500 office workers in New York voted to leave the United Office and Professional Workers Union, and to apply to the A.F.L. for a charter.

Both the office workers and the tenant farmers made it clear that they are firm believers in the principles of industrial unionism, that is to say, those principles upon which the C.I.O. was founded. But in both cases, the workers, who constitute the progressive element in their fields, found that the anti-democratic union leadership made the proper functioning of the union impossible. No union can function, certainly not militantly, under the stultifying whip of bureaucracy and class-collaporation which are the chief features of Communist Party union policy.

CORNER By Max Shachtman

When they cannot conveniently find anything else to say against "Trotskyism," the amateur wits among our opponents in the labor movement try to make merry over our international organization. It does not, you see, have a million members in its ranks; it does not have a powerful and well-financed apparatus; and it does not always function with that perfect unanimity displayed, let us say, by a Stalinist Congress.

Now, all this is true. But it is no less true that our International, which has suffered for more than ten years from a double-barrelled persecution such as no section of the labor movement has ever experienced, has nevertheless succeeded in preserving and extending the only revolutionary organization functioning in the world today. It is simply a statement of fact when we say that the banner of the Fourth International is now unfurled in almost two-score countries, and on every continent of the globe. The Third International has no banner; its sections are able to wave only the pay-checks of the Kremlin bureaucracy or their respective national capitalist flags. As for the Second International, the only banner its sections have in common is the white flag of surrender.

A Very Quiet Funeral

There is of course the Lovestone "International." More accurately, there was-for it is now at an end. And it would be hard to imagine a quieter funeral, so few are the mourners at its bier and so nonchalant the gravediggers. The announcement of the burial is made in the current issue of the Workers Age, and since it is a family affair in Potter's Field there is not even a request for flowers.

Although the death seems to have occurred in the bright daylight of December 19, 1938, there were evidently so many more important trifles to take care of that Lovestone didn't get around to making the announcement until three months later. In the intervening period Lovestone was so busy clinging to Homer Martin's heels, from which he has just been unceremoniously kicked away, that the corpse of his "International" was allowed to lie around without even public notice of its demise.

We learn now that last December 19, Lovestone's National Committee wrote a letter to the German Brandlerites (C.P.O.) which, in effect, called the whole thing off. The reasons seem to be the mistaken "organizational methods" employed by Brandler in dealing with his own dissidents, and a dispute over the attitude of the International Communist Opposition (the Lovestone-Brandler organization) towards the British Independent Labour Party. Brandler appears to favor support to his own tiny "left wing" in the I.L.P.; Lovestone piously opposes "boring from within."

"If you are so ready to reject such people as Fenner Brockway as revolutionary socialists, where will you ever find the people with and through whom a new revolutionary International could possibly be built? Our attitude is quite different. Our experience with Fenner and others like him (it is not a case of Brockway personally) convinces us that it is here we must look for the cadres of the future."

Painting Broadway Red

The mental picture of Lovestone making a revoluionary Marxist out of old Fenner Brockway by buttering his joints and stroking his locks, surpasses anything you can find in the comic strips. The real bosses of the LLP, are its incorrigible Parliamentarians, like Maxton. The party proposes, but Maxton disposes. He flouts the wordy "radical" decisions of the party with impunity, and doesn't hesitate to blackmail the membership into submission to his private policy by threats about what the party would be without the blessings of his presence Brockway's role in the past few years has been that of mediator between the Maxtonians and the militant I.L.P. membership-what's left of it. That is, he is the chain that binds the rank and file to Maxton's wagon. And while these Washington representatives of the present ruling class shovel out funds by the billion in order to bomb cities, shoot down women and children, desolate whole nations in defense of their profits, they haggle among themselves over the possible repercussions still further reductions in the meager appropriations for the unemployed would bring about.

That the very person whom they now deny a meal, and a bed to sleep in will later die on a bayonet in defense of their profits does not move them in the least. "He's a sucker," they say among themselves. "So he fights and dies for the company stockholders. So what? If he's fool enough to do it, there's no one to blame but himself."

The Plumbers Strike

The Socialist Appeal greets with enthusiasm the splendid struggle of Plumbers and Gasfitters Local No. 463 of Manhattan and the Bronx for the six-hour day and retention of the present wage rate.

This strike, brought about by a revolt of the membership against an attempt of the Master Plumbers with the assent of the International leadership to put over the 7-hour day and a 10% pay reduction, is but one indication of the rising temper of building trades workers against years of unemployment and chiselling on working conditions and wages.

Local No. 463 has elected a strike committee, secured strike headquarters, elected publicity, picket and other committees; picketing by the membership is carried on throughout the city and they have issued the first number of a strike bulletin. Remember this is the Plumbers union.

Building Trades Workers generally are reported to be in solidarity with the Plumbers. Pickets were enthusiastically greeted everywhere. Members of Local No. 1 Plumbers and Gas Fitters of Brooklyn and Queens, despite the fact that they have an agree-

Those militants who flocked to the C.I.O. with the sincere hope of forging mighty mass unions have before them an object lesson. Unless the C.I.O., and those principles which it stood for at its founding, are to be completely lost, it is absolutely necessary to rid the unions of Stalinist influence. And that can best be accomplished by uniting in progressive groups which can pit organized resistance against Stalinist domination and policies. Where the structure of the union, or the control of the Stalinists, rules out the democratic expression of membership will, there is a union doomed to death.

A union cannot possibly function for the best interests of its membership if it is dominated by a clique which thinks in terms of its own reactionary, factional necessities. In such a case, progressive unionists are forced to seek a path which will free them from the blight of Stalinism. The sharecroppers, who returned to an independent status, and the office workers who returned to the A.F.L., acted in accord with that necessity.

Curbing the Press

One of the "glorious principles of democracy" which we will presently be asked to "defend" with our lives, is freedom of the press. We are told that one of the features distinguishing a democratic nation from a dictatorial nation is the freedom which is granted the press in the democratic nation.

If all this is true, then France can be wiped from the list of the democracies. She has moved over into the company of those nations which supposedly have a monopoly on destruction of liberty and human rights.

As a direct result of the decree powers handed over to Daladier last week, a whole series of laws muzzling the press are now being formulated. These laws ostensibly are in the interests of "national defense"but an idea of their true nature can be gained from the fact that among other things they will prohibit criticism of Hitler, Mussolini, or any other head of a government no matter how inhuman and brutal he may be. So far as the workers' press of France is concerned, these laws will completely suppress and muzzle it if they do not immediately wipe it out of existence.
