


Today, at last, the world can see quite plainly the real meaning of the Moscow Trials.

Stalin's Capitulation to Hitler Increases War Danger; Threatens **Existence of Soviet Workers**

Headlines in the capitalist press scream about Stalin's betrayal of the "democracies." In contrast, the putrid Stalinist press, in obedience to the Kremlin Butcher, calls the alliance a "blow for peace" and a "victory" for Stalin.

They both lie. They lied unitedly yesterday, they lie separately today. They both-Stalin and the democracies"-betrayed the illusory hopes of the masses. They deceived the peoples with the myth that the conflict between the imperialist powers is a conflict between "fascism" and "democracy." They fooled the masses into believing that the coming war is a war of "ideologies." To help this myth, the "democracies" helped dress Stalin up as a "democrat."

> Stalin fawningly sought the favor of the Western imperialists, providing them with the "Peoples Fronts" which brought about the victory of Franco over the Spanish masses and Daladier's dictatorship over the French working class.

Will Earn No Gratitude

In gratitude for these services, he was left out in the cold at the time of Munich, when his "democratic" allies believed they could buy peace from Hitler by giving him a free hand against Czechoslovakia and the Ukraine.

The brand of gratitude that Stalin will get from Hitler was foreshadowed by the fate of Poland. Only last September, when the Nazis marched on Czechoslovakia, Poland was allowed to participate in the partition of that country as payment for its neutrality. With Hitler's blessing a year ago, the Poles took Teschen. Today they are on the verge of being taken themselves.

The annexation of Poland by the Nazis, in whatever form it may take place, will only bring closer the day of Hitler's assault upon Soviet Russia with the full blessings of his present enemies in the West.

Whom can the people trust?

Faced with the supreme questions-the question of war, and the question of the preservation of freedom from fascism and totalitarian dictatorship-on whom can we, the masses of workers and farmers, rely?

We were told to trust in a "collective security" which would be brought about by the "great democratic powers". These powers, led by their Edens and Chamberlains and Blums and Daladiers, showed the kind of collective security they were interested in when they handed Ethiopia to Italy, Spain to Franco, and Czechoslovakia to Hitler. Above all, we were told to put our faith in Stalin, the

"mighty bulwark of peace and democracy", the genial chief of the peoples of the world.

Now Stalin drives home a blow against the people everywhere beside which Munich pales into insignificance. Never, perhaps, in history, has there been a more brutal, cynical betrayal of the hopes of a great part of mankind. Do you think Roosevelt is fashioned from a different

The Berlin-Moscow Treaty

ARTICLE I

The two contracting parties obligate themselves to refrain from every act of force, every aggressive action and every attack against one another, including any single action or that taken in conjunction with other powers.

(This means that the Soviet Union gives Hitler a free hand not only in Poland, but also wherever else he may choose in the future to strike.)

ARTICLE II

In case one of the parties of this treaty should become the object of warlike acts by a third power, the other party will in no way support this third power.

(This means that Stalin promises not to help any power which may desire to block Hitler's "aggressions".

ARTICLE III

The governments of the two contracting parties in the future will constantly remain in consultation with one another in order to inform each other regarding questions of common interest.

(This means that both Stalin and Hitler are now bound by ties of deep mutual interest and that they will act in unison in the international political arena.)

ARTICLE IV

Neither of the high contracting parties will associate itself with any other grouping of powers which directly or indirectly is aimed at the other party.

(This means that Russian participation in any bloc of powers aimed at Hitler is henceforth excluded.)

Stop Fascism In America!

Will Father Coughlin Become **Dictator of the United States?**

> By JOSEPH HANSEN. (SIXTH INSTALLMENT)

During the World War the French had used Negro troops from their colonies to fight where the carnage was the bloodiest at the front. The United States, too, sent over large numbers of colored troops. All these Negroes fought with unparalleled bravery and thus won the especial hate of the German patriots. Men like Hitler feared the Negroes and considered them on the same level as apes.

Hitler played on this hate. He wove fantastic stories about the Negroes that would have shocked even a Southern Bourbon lynch-lover.

Who was responsible for bringing the Negroes to the Rhine? The Jews, stormed Hitler. It was the Jews in the first place who instigated education for the Negroes, "born half-ape." This act of the Jews was "nothing less than a sin against the will of the eternal Creator." (Mein Kampf, p. 640.)

"African negroes rape our women and children. . ." (Mein Kampf, p. 532.)

"The black disgrace works havoc on the Rhine. Women, girls and children pay for the bestial negroes' lust with their death. An uninterrupted stream of poison and disease flows into the blood of our people." (Mein Kampf, p. 540.)

"It was and is the Jews who bring the negro to the Rhine, always with the same concealed thought and the clear goal of destroying, by the bastardization which would necessarily set in, the white race which they hate." (Mein Kampf, p. 449.)

Through a lurid campaign such as this against the Negroes who had fought on the side of the Allies in the World War Hitler brought his audiences to the seething point, then he directed this rage against the Jews who lived in Germany.

"This infection of our blood, which hundreds of thousands of our people overlook as though blind, is moreover promoted systematically by the Jews today. Systematically these black parasites of the nations ravish our innocent young blonde girls and thus destroy something that can never again be replaced in this world." (Mein Kampf, p. 826.)

'The personification of the Devil, as the symbol of all evil, assumes the living appearance of the Jew." (Mein Kampf, p. 447.)

"Therefore I believe today that I am acting in the sense of the Almighty Creator: BY WARDING OFF THE JEWS I AM FIGHTING FOR THE LORD'S WORK." (Mein Kampf, p. 84.)

In the event of a conflict between the contracting parties concerning any question, the two parties will adjust this difference or conflict exclusively by friendly exchange of opinions or if necessary, by an arbitration commission.

ARTICLE V

(This means confirmation of the intimate relations now obtaining between Stalin and Hitler.)

ARTICLE VI

The present treaty will extend for a period of ten years with the condition that if neither of the contracting parties announces its abrogation within one year of expiration of this period, it will continue in force automatically for another period of five years.

(This means that both Stalin and Hitler look forward to long, happy and mutually profitable relationship.)

ARTICLE VII

The present treaty shall be ratified within the shortest possible time. The exchange of ratification documents shall take place in Berlin. The treaty becomes effective immediately upon signature.

(This means that ratification is but a formality, and will be accomplished without delay.)

They tortured workers-not in the "refined" Italian way with castor oil, but by stripping their victim, man or woman, naked, strapping him down to a table, and then beating him unconscious with rubber hoses.

No one stopped them.

In fact the police helped the Brown Shirts. If a worker attempted to defend himself from the Brown Shirts, then the police arrested him.

When the Brown Shirts became strong enough to flaunt arms, the police furnished large quantities.

The Brown Shirts began killing workers in the streets. All over Germany, workers suffered from these murderous attacks of the Brown Shirts.

Still no one stopped them.

Der Fuehrer stepped up the brutality of his campaign. From the Rhine to the Baltic, he organized small militant groups of Brown Shirts to break up gatherings of workers.

Hitler describes one of the encounters between his men and the workers in the following words:

"My men rushed into the attack like wolves. They hurled themselves on their adversaries in packs of eight or ten and began to drive them out of the hall by showering them with blows. The hubbub lasted twenty minutes. By this time, our adversaries, of whom there were perhaps seven or eight hundred, had most of them been thrown out of the hall and driven down the stairs by my men, of whom there were less than fifty. . . That evening we really learned many things." (Quoted in Fascism and Big Business, p. 101-2. See also Mein Kampf, p. 748.)

After that evening, Der Fuehrer called his men Storm Troopers.

Stalin's Capitulation to Hitler

By Dwight Macdonald — SPARKS IN THE NEWS Increases War Danger; Threatens

"Business Is Business"

The great nations are today helping one another to be ready to fight, quite possibly with each other, as never before. From their principal ports hundreds of ships are streaming over the seas with the finished products and the materials which war must have. "Business is business." and in no business today is there more intense competition than there is in this great business. All perfectly legal, of course; yet, for example, it cannot be exactly pleasant, just now. for an Englishman to learn that Britain is sending 300,000 tons of coal to Germany every month; that Italy has just arranged for 1,000,000 tons of that necessity, from British mines; that during 1938 Germany received from Britain, France and Belgium ten million metric tons of imports largely of a character of potential assistance to her in preparation for war; that during 1938 Germany's imports of pig iron and scrap were nearly five times greater than they were two years before; that Britain, France and Belgium sent to Germany 45 per cent of that nation's recently imported supplies of iron ore and ore containing manganese. And the great supplies of oil that Britain has sent to Germany are, of course, a matter of common knowledge.

Britain's aircraft factories are producing large quantities of planes for export as well as those for her own defense. The United States' exports to Japan have been, and are being, of enormous assistance to that country. The Netherlands East Indies are practically defenseless, and the jittery mood of those important islands is evidenced by the wiring of oil wells for destruction. Yet the Netherlands were one of the three countries which supplied Japan with 75 per cent of her war necessities last year. Russia, of course, has sent vast sup-

plies to China, but Germany's deep affection for Japan has not interfered with her also entering the rich Chinese market. Indeed, Tokyo believes that Germany has aided China in this respect more than has any other nation. In the World War thousands of German soldiers perished before Verdun on barbed wire "made in Germany" which France received, through Switzerland, shortly before the war began, and many a British soldier met his death through an agency that was the product of his homeland. So it would be again.

Krupps still find business satisfaction in the fact that at Jutland both the British and German fleets carried their products. Before Hitler, Krupps employed 46,000; today, 105,000. Business is excellent. A recent annual report of Krupps ended thus:

In conclusion, the committee desires to report that it has taken full cognizance of reports that a conference designed to bring to pass a reduction of armaments is to be held, and that it has definitely established that these reports are baseless. The industry may, therefore, be assured that the coming year will be a period of undisturbed activity and steadily increasing prosperity. Makers of armaments in other lands also

The Race Riots in Chicago

Twenty years ago this summer, there took place the notorious Chicago race riots. They are a good example of how neces-Take away the war-making sary it is to turn our backs on whatever the American bourpower from the President and geoisie says about the Negroes.

What precisely happened in Chicago twenty years ago? Thousands of Negroes will unsuspectingly give you the account given by Congressman Ellender in the debate on the Anti-Lynching ism and its war, and against its Bill, Feb. 15, 1938. Many revolutionists, including J. R. Johnson, Stalinist and social-democratic for years accepted it in outline, and it is probable that many still do, thereby subjecting themselves to the American bourgeoisie.

REVOLUTION OF THE Bourgeois History

Mr. Ellender quotes extensively from the World's Work for December 1922, whose version runs as follows:

The great exodus of Negroes from the South created problems of adjustment between whites and blacks and of course the Negroes were the ones who caused the trouble. They were "illiterate", their manners were "uncouth", their clothes "outlandish and bad-smelling". When they found themselves sitting side by side with white people in trolley cars, the Negroes did not know how to behave. They "sprawled in their seats." They insisted on sitting when white women were standing. They went to live in quarters which white immigrants had for years regarded as their own; their children began to mingle in large number with the white children in the schools. But what "caused the greatest ill-feeling" was the increasing presence of Negro men and women in the public recreation centers. These impudent Negroes sat in considerable numbers on the park benches. played baseball and basketball on the public fields, they appeared in the municipal dance halls, they shared public bathing beaches with the whites, and, the final crime, "the mere fact that they attended band concerts in large numbers added to the ill-feeling."

Thus was the atmosphere created in which any small incident could and did precipitate a fearful race-riot.

Now the natural reaction of a Negro, or a white person who resents white arrogance to Negroes, is to say as follows: If

Negroes went to the parks, played baseball and listened to concerts, they were perfectly justified in doing so, and if race-riots took place, it was not the Negroes' fault. > Stockyards Labor Council repudiated the color-line and made a drive to organize the Negroes, for without them, the whites could not win. This was death for the meat-packing bosses and they used mounted police to break these meetings up. Against this, the Stockyards Labor Council called a protest strike and won, and to celebrate, they called a great parade of white and Negro workers in the Negro neighborhood for July 6.

Warning of Stalin's Perfidy, The Appeal Forecast the Pact

And how does Stalin propose to meet that danger? As Utopian as he is contemptible, Stalin proposes to meet it by begging for a deal. Ironically enough, he tries to adopt the 'policy of appeasement' which he himself declares has been Hitler's chief support. . . .

And once again, for the thousandth time, history is making clear: The Soviet Union cannot, and will not be defended by the degenerate and counter-revolutionary Stalin and his gang.

The Soviet Union can be defended not by "appeasing" any imperialism, democratic or fascist, but by overthrowing every imperialism, democratic and fascist.

To struggle against every imperialism. above all their own imperialist states, this is the task of the workers of the world. And to carry through this task they must cast from their backs the hangman of the Kremlin who last Friday drove one more nail deep into the coffin which he has designed for the October Revolution.

Fascism? That has nothing to do with it. There can be no question, according to Stalin's words, of an attack by Hitler on the Ukraine and there is not the slightest basis of a military conflict with Hitler.

The abandonment of the policy of "alliance of the democracies" is supplemented at once with a humiliating cringing before Hitler and hurried polishing of his boots. Such is Stalin! In Czecho-Slovakia the capitulation of the "democracies" before fascism found expres sion in a change of government. In the U.S. S.R., thanks to the totalitarian regime, Stalin is his own Benes and his own General Syrovy. He replaces the "principles" of his policy precisely in order not to find himself replaced. The Bonapartist clique wants to live and govern. Everything else is for it a question of "technique."

What is the lesson? During the last three years Stalin called all the companions of Lenin agents of Hitler. He exterminated the flower of the General Staff. He shot, discharged and deported about 30,000 officersall under the same charge of being agents of Hitler or his allies. After having dismembered the party and decapitated the army, now Stalin is openly posing his own candidacy for the role of-principal agent of Hitler. 

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Browder "Explains"

A lengthy editorial in the August 23 Daily Worker and a press interview with Earl Browder in the following issue constitute, for the moment, the official Stalinist explanation of the Hitler-Stalin pact.

Two main points strike the reader as soon as he reads the apologies and then compares them to the pact.

The Stalinist editorial, in justifying the pact as leaving the Stalin regime free to go on to make an alliance with the "democracies", rested its case entirely on the assumption that the Hitler-Stalin pact would contain an "escape" clause. The editorial said :

"And here it must be stressed that in each and every non-aggression pact which the Soviet Union concludes there is a basic clause of Soviet peace policy which provides that in the event one of the parties to the pact invades or commits an act of aggression against a third nation, that the ney Victor Anderson to wangle an indictment other party (the Soviet Union) is not bound to against them from a handpicked federal grand the treaty, is free to act in defense of peace."

The Raw Deal

In their vicious attack upon the unemployed of Minneapolis and the nation, the federal authorities are piling outrage upon outrage. Not content with slashing the wages and jobs of the unemployed, the WPA urged the Minneapolis police on to a murderous attack upon a peaceful picket line. FBI men disguised as WPA workers mingled with the pickets the night of bloody Friday, playing the role of agents-provocateur.

Attorney General Frank Murphy, President Roosevelt and Governor Stassen vie with one another in attacking the WPA strike and the strikers.

Now the federal grand jury sitting in St. Paul has interrupted its hearings long enough to hand down indictments against 103 jobless citizens, charging them with a felony which carries a penalty of two years' imprisonment.

The boss press joins with U. S. deputy marshals in carrying out sensational raids on workers' homes, and picturing the victims as dangerous criminals.

Federal Judge Bell joins the anti-labor pack by setting bail for the arrested strikers at \$5,000 and \$10,000 each.

The ridiculousness of the whole situation is only equalled by the serious implications which the repression of the WPA strikers has for the future of organized labor in the United States.

Imagine the marshals surrounding the humble home of a WPA worker at 5 o'clock in the morning, breaking in, handcuffing a \$60.50-amonth unemployed worker and dragging him off to jail, in the light of flashlight bulbs in the cameras of the boss press photographers. Imagine setting bail at \$10,000 - for honest workers whom even the boss courts haven't yet proved guilty of a single crime, for workers, heads of families, who have lived here all their lives.

In signing the pact with Hitler, Stalin may not, as some wags put it, have joined the Anti-Comintern Bloc, but he did deliver a mortal blow to what is left of the communist parties organizationally. The resignation from the Communist party of Gabriel Peri, Stalinist spokesman in the French Chamber of Deputies and foreign editor of l'Humanite, who, under recent Kremlin tutelage became a raving French chauvinist, is only the first prominent herald of the hailstorm which will disintegrate the Stalinist parties in those few countries in which they still have any influence.

The Pact shows the hollowness of Hitler's declamations of a crusade against the Comintern which he knew better than the next man had long ago been destroyed as a revolutionary force by the Stalin clique itself. The reactions of the "respectable" capitalist press and the Leaders of Public Opinion - from the Herald-Tribune to the New Leader-are as usual arch-hypocritical, and where they do not outrage an elementary sense of decency, they are simply ludicrous: the gentlemen who, in the interests of American imperialism, hailed Roosevelt when he pressed to his bosom butchers like Batista of Cuba, Vargas of Brazil and Somoza of Nicaragua, pretend to be overwhelmed with indignation that a Stalin could join hands with a Hitler.

Making "Victory" of Capitulation

Yet, most revolting of all is the brutal cynicism of the Stalin regime in trying to pass off its capitulation to Hitler as a triumph for the "forces of de-mocracy." "the democratic front," "the cause of peace" and—most impudent of all—"the independence of Poland.

More than a year ago, in April 1938, Earl Browder wrote that 'the New Republic has gone over openly to the Chamberlain line (March 30 issue) by advocating rapprochement with Hitler without political conditions." What else did Stalin do a few days ago?

On November 14, 1938, at the 21st anniversary of the Russian Revolution meeting of the C.P., the same Browder said: "The reactionaries openly speculate that the Soviet Union may try to beat Chamberlain at his own game by joining hands with Hitler. But even those who hate the land of socialism cannot believe it, when they see the Soviet Union alone rounds up the traitorous agents of Hitler within its own land, and puts them beyond all possibility of doing any more of their wrecking, spying and diversions for fascism."

Now, "joining hands with Hitler" is explained away by the same Kremlin mercenary as "a distinct contribution for the protection of the threatened peace of the world"-an almost word-forword plagiarism from Chamberlain's Munich-period speeches.

"The direct lie was given to all protestations that the Munich Pact was an achievement for peace," Browder said, and rightly, last December, when, directly afterward, all governments announced vast expansions of their armed forces as their first response."

What is to be said, then, for the "peace contribution" of the Hitler-Stalin Pact when, on its very heels, follow more brutal Nazi demands on Poland, and the mobilization of troops in virtually every corner of Europe, troops who may be marching under cannon-fire by the time this appears in print?

The "escape" clause was the primary justification made for the pact. That alibi has now blown up in Browder's face.

The other striking fact is the frenzied effort, in both the editorial and in Browder's statements, to define the pact as somehow not an alliance. That alibi, too, is blown up by the actual text of the pact, which constitutes as tightly-knit an alliance as the Soviet Union has ever engaged in.

Why this anxiety not to describe it as an alliance? Lenin used to say that the Soviet Union, if necessary, would make an alliance with the devil and his grandmother - if it served the world revolution. For example, in Lenin's time, the Soviet government made an alliance with Turkey, while the Turkish government was hounding Communists. Why can't Stalin, therefore, appeal to the example of Lenin?

He can't, and the Stalinists shy as far away as they can from such analogies, because the entire political conception and method employed by Lenin is completely foreign to Stalin. While Lenin's government made an alliance with Kemal Pasha, the Communist Party of Turkey was engaged in attempting to overthrow Kemal Pasha; likewise with the Rapallo treaty of 1922 with the German Republic, etc., etc.

But under Stalin? Not the least of the benefits derived by an ally of Stalin's is the subordination of the Communist Party of the allied country to its existing government. Laval and Daladier received the loyalty of the French Communist Party, etc. Even the hope of an alliance is enough to provide Roosevelt with the loyalty of the American Communist Party. Therein lies the abominable treachery of Stalin's Pact, conceived by the Kremlin bureaucracy in a desperate effort to save its miserable hide.

We said above: "bought off one enemy." But only for a moment. Tomorrow Hitler will repay his new partner, and richly. . . Tomorrow, Stalin's crimes, and the advance of Hitlerism which they facilitate, will pose ever more clearly and urgently the Russian dilemma:

Either a new revolution that will stamp out the curse of Stalinism or the reduction of the Soviet Union to a colony of fascism.

Kremlin Unmasks Itself We were never partisans of the Stalinist policy of yesterday, the so-called "democratic front," the

policy of war alliance with Anglo-French impe. ialism, with its conversion of the masses into cannon fodder for the preservation of the loot taken by the "democracies" in the last war. But then, at least, the Kremlin gang had a plausible-specious screen behind which to operate. It could exploit the truly deep mass hatred of fascism with comparative ease: it could pretend that it was acting on behalf of Loyalist Spain or semi-colonial China; it could easily claim to be warding off fascist warmongering and the danger of war in general.

The open shift to Hitler, however, cannot be justified by the Stalinists with the remotest degree of plausibility, and Browder's arguments, multiplied by a dozen more that will be thought up for him, will impress only ox-heads, and even they would only be impressed by his vast effrontery. For no amount of wriggling can prevent the masses from assimilating the basic truths we have been repeating for some time:

The Stalinist bureaucracy, personified in Stalin is at the end of its rope. It rules, and cannot but rule, by terror and fear, because it is itself terrified and afraid. It is concerned least of all-Hitler, Ribbentrop and Mussolini have known it for years-with world revolution or the "Comintern." It is as much interested in "democracy" as in the snows of yesteryear. It is concerned, exclusively, with preserving itself and its tremendous vested interests, which are in direct conflict with the interests of revolution and of the world labor movement, Russia's included.

It fears war, primarily for its own sake. And here, as is so often the case nowadays, the fear of war is the fear of revolution . . . the revolution of the Soviet masses against the anti-Soviet bureau-
