Bucking the War Censors

As in the last war every important channel of communication from Europe to this country is under the control of the British censorship. It would not make much difference anyway for with or without British and French persuasion, the press and radio are already dinning into the American people propaganda designed to win popular support for American participation in the war. Every drop of truth in the news is submerged in a torrent of lies. All the official admissions made after the first world war of the deliberate use of lying propaganda to fool the people have been buried under the new flood of falsehoods. The big headlines are reserved for meaningless war communiques, rumors and war lies. The more significant news is distorted beyond recognition, absent altogether or reduced to tiny, unnoticed, and unexplained paragraphs. In this column we shall try to notice and explain some of the news of this kind.

The South African cabinet split, seven for joining Britain in war, five for remaining neutral. In Parliament the issue was brought to a vote, 80 for war, 66 for neutrality. This division obviously reflected a tremendous weight of opinion in the country for neutrality. But when Premier Hertzog demanded a general election-which in this case would be nothing but a popular referendum on the war issue—the British governor-general flatly refused. Hertzog's government was overthrown and a new war cabinet formed.

Thus the votes of two cabinet ministers and 14 members of the South African parliament provide the basis for plunging the dominion into war! "Democracy" apparently is only to be permitted when the votes go the way the rulers of the empire want

Incidentally, although the refusal to permit a general election was reported by the official British news agencies, the American reports completely omitted this crucial detail in the dispatches on this point. Did it suggest something too much like the universal demand in this country that the people themselves decide the issue of war or peace?

Both the British and the Nazis and the British are playing with methods of propaganda containing enough dynamite to blow up both sides in this gangster war.

British planes dropped leaflets in Germany urging the people to overthrow Hitler in order to make peace. One day they will do so, but not at the behest of the British rulers! For the British rulers themselves will be facing the guns they have placed in the hands of the British workers. That's the way-the only wav this war can end with any hope for the future of all men.

The Nazis in Berlin let it be known that along the Siegfried line German soldiers have scrawled on the pillboxes facing the French Maginot line: "We won't shoot if you don't!"

Since 1933 I have been showing and proving in the world press that Stalin is seeking an understanding with Hitler. In particular, I proved this prognosis in my declarations before the Dewey Commission of Inquiry in Coyoacan in April, 1937 (Case of Leon Trotsky, Harper's and Bros., New York). Now the cynics in the service of the Kremlin are trying to represent the matter as if their program-"alliance of the democracies" and "collective security"was corroborated; meanwhile, my prognosis was wrong: I predicted, it is alleged, the conclusion of an aggressive military pact, while

Stalin and Hitler completed only a pacifist, humanitarian pact of mutual non-aggression (Hitler is, as known, a strict vegetarian). Isn't it all too clear why Hitler started the attack on Poland immediately after the embrace of Ribbentrop and Molotov? Some of the less intelligent defenders of the Kremlin remembered. unexpectedly, (they did not know it before) that Poland is a "semi-fascist state." It seems, that under the beneficent influence of Stalin, Hitler started a war against "semi-fascism."

Or perhaps Hitler only imposed upon the childish confidence of Stalin? If that were so, Stalin could have promptly dispelled the delusion. But in fact the Supreme Soviet immediately ratified the pact at the same moment when the German troops crossed the Polish border. Stalin knew very well what he was do-

In order to attack Poland and to conduct a war against England and France, Hitler needed the friendly "neutrality" of the USSR, plus Soviet raw materials. The political and commercial pacts assure Hitler of both.

Behind the Stalin-Hitler Pact

- What It Is and What It Isn't

(Concluded from Last Issue)

Workers Traded for "Alliances"

In Lenin's time, the Soviet government made more than one diplomatic or commercial agreement with capitalist countries. That was unavoidable then, and remains unavoidable so long as a workers' government is surrounded by a hostile world. But if Lenin made a diplomatic agreement with Germany or France, he did not compel the revolutionary movement in those countries to stop fighting its own capitalist class and government.

Stalin changed all that. While he was seeking an alliance with England, France and the United States, especially in the past four years, the Communist Parties in those countries tried with might and main to make an alliance with the home capitalist government and urged the labor movement as a whole to follow suit. Where the Communists had once been the champions of labor's independence and militancy, Stalin converted them into the champions of labor's subordination and docility to capitalism.

In practise; therefore, especially in recent years, "socialism in one country" meant that Stalin traded off Communist Party support to any government, no matter how reactionary, no matter how many millions of colonial slaves it oppressed, so long as it promised to be an "ally" in protecting the Soviet bureaucracy.

In practise, also, Stalin's Russian nationalism meant putting the fate of the Russian Revolution into the hands of cynical imperialist diplomats who pretended for a moment to be friendly, instead of where it belongs-into the hands of the Russian and international working class.

In practise, this working class was confused, demoralized, and driven under the yoke of its enemies.

Stalin's Reactionary Dual Policy

Thus, the interests of the ruling bureaucracy in Russia have come into ever sharper and finally irreconcilable conflict with the interests of the Russian masses, of the Soviet Union itself, and of the international working class. To maintain its increasingly precarious position, this bureaucracy is ready to sacrifice the interests of the Soviet people and of the labor movement throughout the world. And that is how it came to sign the pact with Hitler.

It may be said that the negotiations for the pact with Hitler must have been going on secretly for a long time. That is undoubtedly true. The former head of the Military Intelligence Service of the Soviets in Western Europe, Walter Krivitsky, revealed the fact that some time ago Stalin sent a special emissary, Kandelaki, to Berlin to press Hitler for an alliance. Then how is one to explain the public efforts, made during this same period, to form an alliance with the "democratic" Powers, France and England?

The explanation reveals the reactionary dual policy that Stalin has been pursuing. It has already been pointed out that Stalin fears war. But he fears especially such a war as the Soviet Union and its bureaucracy are involved in, for that would in all likelihood spell his doom.

It would, however, be wrong to jump to the conclusion that Stalin is a real prop of peace. The same reasons that dictate his yearning for peace for Russia, dictate a policy of war-mongering in all the other important countries of the world!

The Practice of "Appeasing" Hitler

The Soviet Union is immediately and directly threatened on two sides: by Japan on the East and by Germany on the West. Neither the Japanese rulers nor Hitler have ever made a secret of their ambition to carve up the Soviet land. By herself, Japan is not so serious a menace to Russia, especially now, when so much of her strength is exerted in maintaining conquered Chinese territory. The principal Soviet enemy thus becomes Hitler. It has therefore been Stalin's policy at bottom, since the Nazis came to power in 1933, to "appease" Hitler, to come to terms with him, to make an alliance with him. Russia would then be in a position to deal comparatively easily with Japan in the

East. If this basic point is borne in mind, much that was obscure in Stalinist policy becomes clear. It will be easier, for example, to understand why the Stalinist press in France, instead of solidarizing itself with the despairing young Jew Herschel Grynzspan who sought to protest Hitlerite anti-Semitism by shooting Von Rath, denounced him as a Nazi or Trotskyist spy! To understand the shameful silence from Soviet officialdom on the occasion of Hiser's barbarous pogroms against the Jews. To understand why Jewish refugees could find no haven in the Soviet Union. To understand what Walter Duranty meant when he cabled the New York Times that after all, Stalin has killed off as many Jews as Hitler did. To understand why Litvinov was purged (how could a sensitive "Aryan" like von Ribbentrop shake hands with a Jewish Foreign Commissar?). And perhaps even to understand why the leader of the Spanish Communist Party, General Miaja, joined the notorious Madrid Defense Junta which graciously handed over power to Franco's Hitler-supported troops!

Policy Breeds Contradictions

The concentration on making a deal with Hitler has frequently been interrupted, so to say, for two reasons: one, by the hope of making an alliance with the "democracies" to squeeze Hitler into a corner and prevent him from assaulting Russia; and two, by the hope that the negotiations with the "democracies" would frighten Hitler into speeding up an agreement with Stalin.

The first hope, illusory and utopian from the beginning,

was completely shattered at Munich. The "democratic" imperialists showed that they would much rather give Hitler free rein in his drive to the East, that is, against Russia, than they would make an alliance with Russia to smash Hitler and Mussolini. Especially when they reflected that after Fascism cracked up in Germany and Italy, revolutions would break out and spread rapidly to France, England and God knows where else!

Stalin therefore had to come to terms with Hitler. And Hitler chose the moment for springing the announcement of the pact which would give him the best position in starting his next conquest, Poland.

But though he capitulated to Hitler, it does not follow that Stalin would object violently to having another World War explode, with the "democracies" fighting the "fascist aggressors" and the Soviet Union staying out of the war as long as possible. Quite the contrary! Stalin continues to drive in just that direction. Although he has made his peace with Hitler for a short time, as we shall see later on, he continues to instigate a war in which he will not participate. As said above, while he is a "pacifist-out-of-fear" at home, he is a warmonger abroad.

That explains the seemingly contradictory statements of the various Communist Parties on the subject of the Hitler-Stalin pact which have proved so puzzling to many. The American, British and French Communist Parties, while enthusiastically endorsing Stalin's appeasement policy towards Hitler, demand in the same breath that Chamberlain, Daladier and Roosevelt "resist the aggressor"-that is, go to war against Hitler. The two confusing and apparently conflicting positions form a harmonious unit, however, once we understand the basic consideration of the desperate Soviet bureaucracy:

Keep ourselves in the saddle, preserve ourselves by hook or crook, and everything else-the labor movement, the Communist International, the colonial peoples, the twaddle about "democracy" and "peace"-can go hang!

Hitler Gave Away Nothing

Will the bureaucracy succeed in keeping itself in the Soviet saddle? Not the slightest hesitation need be felt in replying categorically: NO! The only point to be resolved is this: the abominable Stalinist clique will be crushed at a later stage by Hitlerism, in which case, a new era of reaction will open up from which the world may not emerge for a long, long time; or it will be swept into the discard by a resurrected revolutionary movement of workers and peasants inside the Soviet Union itself. All our hopes and all our energies must be directed towards the latter solution of the mortal crisis the Russian Revolution is experiencing.

Will Hitler really attack the Soviet Union? Whoever examines the situation intelligently must reply, Yes! The feeble Stalinist arguments that the "pact has weakened the Axis" are so much nonsense, and dangerous nonsense at

What Stalin gave away in the pact we have already seen. What did Hitler abandon? His designs upon Russia, especially on the granary of the Ukraine and the mineral riches of the Urals? Not for a moment! His idea of immediately attacking the Soviet Union? He didn't have to give up that idea, for the simple reason that he did not contemplate such an attack at this time. His objective, for the time being, is more modest-the conquest of Poland-and Stalin gave him invaluable aid in achieving his goal.

He did abandon Japan, of that there is no doubt. And the Stalinist press presents this as a tremendous victory. But it is, as usual, only duping itself and its followers. Hitler abandoned a very much weakened Japan, which had already served his purposes for the current stage of developments. Hitler abandoned Japan for the time being, and only for the time being, in exchange for a much solider ally.

Hitler Understands Stalinism

And he did abandon the so-called "Anti-Comintern Pact." Small consolation! The "fight against the Communist International" was as much a fraud with Hitler as the "fight for democracy" was with Stalin. HITLER HAS KNOWN FOR YEARS THAT STALIN HIMSELF LIQUIDATED THE COMMUNIST INTERNATION-AL. Hitler has known for years that the Stalin-controlled International is about as revolutionary, as much a threat to capitalist society, as the Salvation Army. The Hitlerites know what Stalinism represents; they know where the real threat of working-class revolution comes from.

The Berlin correspondent of the New York Times, Otto D. Tolischus, who knows what the Nazis are thinking, wrote an extremely significant comment on Hitlerite reactions to the pact. Speaking of the "revolutionary" change that has taken place in Soviet affairs, he said on August 27, 1939: "Such a revolution within Bolshevism is precisely what the Germans assume as a basis for their calculations. Stalin, they hold, has turned Right and international Bolshevism has become national Bolshevism, which eliminates the menace of an international Communism backed by Moscow. If that is true, the dead Marshal Tukhachevsky has triumphed over George Dimitroff with the paradoxical result that the Communist parties in various other countries have been left high and dry. However, according to the German view, they have been regarded in Moscow as 'Trotskyists' anyhow, as revealed during the Spanish conflict, which is regarded here as a turning point in Bolshevist developments. They are, therefore, expected to adopt Leon Trotsky as their leader and perhaps even to start a revolutionary campaign against 'Stalinism' within Russia which would complete the revolutionary circle."

Seen with a somewhat distorted vision, the report is nonetheless substantially correct.

Both Stalin and Hitler Fear Revolutionists

It is not the discredited pawn of Stalinist diplomacy, the Communist International, that Fascism fears. As the banner-bearer of the working-class revolution, of the revolution for socialism, it sees the "Trotskyists"-the Fourth International. And it is right, for the Fourth International is the mortal, implacable foe of Fascism, of imperialism in general, of capitalist oppression and as their foe it shall

That is why the Socialist Workers Party summons every militant worker who is conscious of his class interests, who is imbued with the real spirit of internationalism, to rally to its great banner and to fight in the great cause. Our call is addressed in particular to the rank and file of the Communist Party and the Young Communist League and their sympathizers.

The Soviet Union is not relieved of the threat of attack; that threat is aggravated. Hitler had a non-aggression pact with Poland not so long ago. But as soon as he had that country well encircled, he denounced the pact on one pretense or another and prepared to absorb the country into Greater Germany. Stalin's policy facilitates the coming attack upon Russia because, by giving Hitler a free hand through Poland, he grants him a highly important strategical base of operations against the Soviet Union, Tomorrow or the next day, Hitler will seek to repay Stalin for the pact in even more ringing coin than he is repaying Poland. Every worker, every Communist worker, must understand that.

Every worker must be also clearly aware now of the monstrous crime that was perpetrated by Stalin in his series of "trials" and purges. How many thousands of revolutionists did he send to their deaths in the last few years on the charge of being "Trotskyist agents of Hitler"! We called the trials frame-ups, and now, by signing the pact with Hitler, Stalin draws the black pencil of emphasis under our charge. Together with Ribbentrop, Molotov and Stalin signed the death-warrant of the Communist Parties. Stalin long ago drained the revolutionary blood out of them. Now he is smashing them bodily. Their organizational disintegration is taking place at a terrific rate before our very eyes.

Where will those sincere and devoted workers go who are now abandoning the Communist Parties by the thousands in England, France and the United States?

Now they no longer declare that "Soviet democracy" and bourgeois democracy are practically the same thing and make natural allies; now they expound the new wisdom that "communism" and "fascism" are the same thing and make natural allies.

Their conclusion? Their road? On to a new War to Make the World Safe for Democracy? On to the trenches! Long live the divine goal of modern humanity-the battlefield graveyard!

Our road was never theirs. Our road leads to the great socialist society. Our methods are the methods of militant and uncompromising class struggle against all exploitation and iniquity. Stalin has succeeded only in-discrediting Stalinism. The banner of revolutionary struggle, of the Fourth International, continues to fly without a shameful spot upon it.

On to the victory of socialism and freedom!

Will Father Coughlin Become Dictator of the United States?

By JOSEPH HANSEN (TENTH INSTALLMENT)

What is a corporate state?

According to the Fascist and Nazi "theoreticians" it is a state in which both capitalists and workers "submerge" their conflicting interests and submit to the will of the "state" as embodied in the person of the dictator.

This pretty theory has not yet been put into practice in either Germany or Italy. In each of these countries the dictator is an agent of the capitalists and all of his actions have been directed against the workers.

Corporate State means in practice the ABSOLUTE RULE OF THE CAPITALISTS.

Father Coughlin, the Radio Priest, wants a state in America like the corporate state of Mussolini and the corporate state of Hitler.

"Today the outposts of Germany are the frontiers of our civilization." (Broadcast, March 24, 1935.)

Father Coughlin, the Radio Priest, wishes to import the Middle Ages to modern United States. In issue after issue of Social Justice, he praises dictator-ridden Portugal to the heavens and holds it up as a model state. Portugal, he explains, was once governed under "Christian principles," that is, the principles of the Roman Catholic Church.

This happy land of feudal barons and miserable serfs was disrupted by the French revolution of 1789-but now thanks to Dictator Salazar, "the world's outstanding Christian statesman . . . who has founded the new Portuguese State, as a firm bulwark against Bolshevism, upon principles of Christian Social Justice" (Social Justice, June 5, 1939, p. 24.) the old state of affairs has been restored. Happy Portugal! To wipe out even the capitalist revolution that overthrew feudalism!

What Portugal has accomplished America can accomplish, particularly since we have plenty available." (Discourse of May 22, 1939. Quoted in Social Justice, June 5, 1939, p. 7.)

"'If we would find a near parallel to Salazar's Portugal we must go to the high middle ages: the Christian monarch, hierarchy, property resting on social sanctions, oustom, duties and social justice. But in the Middle Ages we had unity of religion, a totalitarian religion."

Small wonder that Father Coughlin, the Radio Priest, has never been excommunicated from the Roman Catholic Church!

The Radio Priest's public program leaves an odor in its wake astonishingly like that of the public programs of Il Duce and Der Fuehrer before they reached power.

The Radio Priest attacks "loan capital," the "international bankers," the "non-religious Jews," the "Bolshevik" leaders of the trade unions. He advocates the government taking over the trade unions (interview published in the Detroit Times, October 10, 1934.) He attacks the "reds," the "socialists," who he says are not at all different from Roosevelt and democratic capitalism. He attacks "majority rule." 'He advocates a "just living annual wage," "monetary reforms," "labor's right to organize," "broadened basis of taxation on capacity to pay," "lower taxes," "conscription of wealth in event of war," and preservation of PRIVATE PROPERTY.

Would the Radio Priest keep his promises if he gained

Let his own words satisfy that question with all the finality of a funeral knell:

"Practically all the sixteen principles of social justice are being put into practice in Italy and Germany." (Social Justice, February 13, 1939, p. 7.)

Coughlin Favors War and the Army

Now that the great wave of Roosevelt's popularity has subsided and the people fear that Roosevelt is preparing to enter the war, the Radio Priest turns out golden phrases against the war beast.

But these dabs of anti-war paint don't hide the cloven hoof of his real program.

Coughlin favors a war machine and the declaration of wow.

"A policy of decent preparedness must prevail. Our people must be protected even at the cost of our lives from unjust aggressors. This shall always be the policy of every American citizen who is ready to lay down his life in a war of self-defense." (Discourse entitled, "The Next (Father Coughlin's Radio Discourses, 1931-1932, p. 129.)

That is the professional war-monger's propaganda without so much as a covering fig-leaf. No ruler of a nation ever began a war without telling the suckers that it was in "self-defense" and that the enemy was the "aggressor."

"In no sense, my fellow Americans, do I wish to be accused of being a pacifist. To quote Gerald W. Johnson, who wrote in 'Harper's Magazine' last November: 'I took so part in the 'No More War' demonstrations of a few years ago." (Discourse entitled, "The Next War," Father Coughlin's Radio Discourses, 1931-1932, p. 138.)

"Social Justice" by that or any other American name it chooses would not be different in its essentials from Fascism in Italy or Nazism in Germany.

If the Radio Priest gains power in the United States, his military expenditures will make Roosevelt's multi-billion dollar army look like a troop of Boy Scouts playing cops and robbers. Stop Fascism in America!

The postcard campaign against Fascism has started. Many people have written to the Chief of Police and the Mayor of New York "demanding" that the police force because of its rank partiality and favoritism toward the Coughlinites be "purged;" and that the "democratic officials" strip the Coughlin movement of "every last vestige of power." The Negro and War

Before Hitler marched into Poland, a great many people kept hoping against hope that a war would not take place after all. That is merely behaving like the ostrich and pretending that something isn't there, because with our heads dug into the ground, we cannot see it. Now, today, they keep hoping that America will not go in. They trust Roosevelt when he says he will try to keep America out. These people are blind to the signs of the times. Every move that Roosevelt makes is towards dragging America in.

Take the question of armaments. During the last five years, every great country doubled and trebled its armaments. Guns and more guns, battleships, submarines and airplanes; soldiers and more soldiers. Whereas in 1932, Great Britain spent 426 millions of dóllars on armaments, in 1938 she spent 1065 millions. Hitler made Germany into one large armament industry. Both armed for the war they knew was coming. But the United States did the same. In 1932 Roosevelt asked Congress for 667 millions of dollars but in 1938 he asked for and got 1065 millions, nearly twice as much, and in 1939 he got two billions. Why? He and Congress, like the other war-mongers in Europe, know that today no country can attack America. But Roosevelt and the American capitalists are not going to keep out when the other imperialist countries are fighting to divide Asia and Africa and the markets in Latin-America. They have to be in, to share in the division. So that when we turn a deaf ear to all Roosevelt's spectacular appeals for peace, and pay attention, not to what he is saying but to what he is doing, we can see that like the rest he is hiding his actions for war behind a mass of words for peace. Remember that Wilson played the same trick in 1917.

Negroes Wanted—To Die

Roosevelt is preparing to go in. The dirty bloody work is going to be done, and as usual whenever dirty work has to be done, the Negroes are going to be called upon to do the dirtiest part of it. Whenever blood is to be shed, the rulers of this country see to it that the Negroes shed theirs. That is a privilege and an honor of which they never deprive the Negro. They take away his vote, give him the worst jobs, shove him into the dirtiest slums, kick him out of restaurants, lynch him. But when they want people to die for "democracy", to dig trenches in France, to build roads, to clean latrines, while enemy bombers rain their bombs, then they are sure to come looking for Negroes. There the rulers of this country are perfectly willing to see that Negroes have their full rights.

But 1939 is not 1914. Today hundreds of thousands of Negroes are saying to themselves:

"Why should I shed my blood for Roosevelt's America, for Cotton Ed Smith and Senator Bilbo, for the whole Jim Crow, Negro-hating South, for the low-paid, dirty jobs for which Negroes have to fight, for the few dollars of relief and the insults, discrimination, police brutality and perpetual poverty to which Negroes are condemned even in the more liberal North.

"And in any case, Negro or not, for what is Roosevelt preparing to drag this country into a war? Why should any poor worker shed his blood? The white man who works in the factory or in the hotel with me, despises me because I am a Negro. But he is very little better off than I am. Since the crisis he and I have often stood outside the relief bureau together, we have fought side by side in the CIO unions, and he is beginning to see that he and I are fellow workers first, last, and all the time. Before we are ready to die for our country, we should have a country to live for. And what part of this country is ours? We produce and for centuries we have produced the wealth of this country. But what do we get in return? And Negroes in particular."

When the ordinary working Negro asks these questions, what can the war-mongers say to him? Nothing. Nothing but lies and empty promises of better treatment in the future. And that is why the Republican Party and the Democratic Party and the Communist Party make special appeals to the Negro on every conceivable topic, but keep far away from the war question.

John L. Lewis

In our last issue, we quoted part of the warmongering speech which John L. Lewis delivered to last Fall's CIO convention in Pittsburgh. On Labor Day, Lewis delivered an address in Ogden, Utah. The differences between the two speeches should be carefully noted.

At Pittsburgh Lewis had said almost nothing about strikes, unemployment, wage standards and such matters, and had waxed eloquent on the beauties of the New Deal and the glories of the coming crusade for democracy. This emphasis was just reversed in the Labor Day speech. In his most blistering style he accused the political leaders of the nation-and he made no distinction between the "Tories" and the Administration-of "incompetence," "callous indifference" and "cold brutality" toward labor and the

And he came out against American participation in the war:

"Labor in America wants no war nor any part of war! Labor wants the right to work and live-not the privilege of dying by gunshot or poison gas to sustain the mental errors of current statesmen. Countries in the Western hemisphere are self-contained and have no need to participate in the festering intrigues and ancient political quarrels of Europe. . . . The country is being told of the statesmen and national leaders who are spending sleepless nights in worry over the situation in Europe. In every way how much better it would be if some statesmen would spend a few nights in devising a way for one-fourth of America's workers to get a job at a wage that would keep them alive!"

These remarks against the War Deal reflect primarily Lewis' response to the growing disillusion with Roosevelt of the CIO ranks. (The Soviet-Nazi Pact is probably a second factor. Lewis, a realist where his own interests are concerned, is evidently getting out from under the collapsing line of his C.P. allies.)

But in what direction is his quest for a new political base taking Lewis? In the same speech, in Republican terminology he denounced "thoughtless and badly executed experimentation" as largely responsible for the present situation, viewed with alarm the national debt, which "has already reached such proportions that it may never be liquidated by orthodox methods," and even grumbled like an old-fashioned protectionist about Secretary Hull's reciprocal trade agreements. Lewis in the Republican camp may seem fantastic to those who not so long ago hailed him as the savior of American labor. But Lewis has never been either a savior or a Moses. He has always been little more than an exceptionally shrewd and forceful old-style "labor leader.'

A speech on a ceremonial occasion by the head of the CIO is no substitute for the necessary concrete program of the CIO against the War Deal. The CIO, the unions of the most decisive section of the American working class, have it in their power to deliver tremendous blows against the war-makers. The forthcoming convention of the CIO, if the ranks throughout the country see to it, can adopt a program and shove it down the throat of every Congressman at the special session which Roosevelt is planning to call for his war plans.

A job for every worker, and to provide it-all war funds to the unemployed! Down with the war! Let the people vote on it! Stop Roosevelt's war plans-defeat his attempt to abolish the embargo provisions of the Neutrality Act! These are among the most important planks in the program which the CIO should adopt-and which the CIO convention will adopt if the CIO membership makes its wishes known.

President William Green of the American Federation of Labor called upon the German workers to refuse to support war preparations "and the war drive which is now being made by their Nazi leaders." Now, Bill, if you'd practice at home what you preach abroad, we'll get places in the struggle against war, and apropos, we'll dislodge the bosses off our backs.

Judas Goats

Even sheep in the stockyards do not willingly go to the slaughter. They herd together for mutual protection when the gates are opened to the chutes leading to the killing pens. Every one who has ever worked in the Chicago stockyards knows what a "Judas Goat" is. Patriarchal, experienced old goats are put in with the sheep. These goats are trained, when the gates open, to walk down the chute to the killing pens. The sheep follow and, one by one, have their throats cut. The Judas Goat goes back to lead another herd down the fatal runway. There are goats in the stockyards who have led literally millions of sheep to their death.

There are also Judas Goats in the world of men, leaders of the workingclass who have led and are leading millions of workers to their deaths on the battlefields of imperialist war. Like their stockyard prototypes, these human Judas Goats don't get killed themselves.

Such were, in the last war, the French Socialists Cachin and Guesde, the British Socialist Hyndman, the Russians Kropotkin and Plekhanov, the American Gompers, the Germans Ebert and Scheidemann and Kautsky. Such are, in this war, Thorez and Cachin and Jouhaux and Citrine (the latter three did it in 1914 too) and practically the entire top leadership of the French and English trade union movements. And over here, in this pre-war period, we have our own Judas Goats-the Browders and Hathaways of the Communist Party, the Lees and Waldmans of the Social Democratic Federation, the editors of the liberal weeklies, the Brouns and Lassers and LaGuardias and Marcantonios and-the greatest Judas Goat of all-Franklin Delano

Irish Show Hostility To British Rulers

Irish Republican Army men stripped two British soldiers of their uniforms and shot another in a fight, in Belfast, Ireland, in a wave of anti-British incidents throughout reland this week.

The Irish people's hostility to British imperialism made impossible any other course than a declaration of Irish neutrality in the war by the Dail Eirann, but President De Valera's hounding of Irish revolutionists continued

Under the "Offenses Against the State Act" passed early this year, the I.R.A. has been declared an illegal organization and this was supplemented last week by a De Valera proclamation setting up special courts to deal with persons arrested under the Act, and establishing "intern ment camps" in which suspected persons may be detained while the Act remains in force.

Army officers of not less rank than that of Commandant are among those who will constitute the special courts. More than forty I.R.A. men were arrested by the Irish Government in the latest incidents.

The most vicious and the most dangerous lie about the war, so far as this country is concerned, is that it is being fought "for democracy" by England and France. I am not going to repeat now the facts about the "democratic" British and French Empires which, for the benefit of a handful of industrialists and bankers in London and Paris, hold in abject slavery six times as many human beings as Hitler rules. I am thinking about a far broader and more startling irony in this lie of a new war for democracy.

Not merely is it absolutely false that this is a war for democracy. The truth, the ironic truth, is that this war which began a week ago is the war to end democracy—as democracy has been known in the modern world-for all time. Not to end it for the period of the war (as the dreamers suppose). but forever.

Bourgeois Democracy: Road's End

Even under the barrage of minute-by-minute events that swamp our nerves and feelings, it is worth a pause to reflect under a wider perspective on the close of a great political era: the era which witnessed the development of bourgeois democracy, the form of government which for some hundreds of years the most advanced statesmen and philosophers thought to be the ultimate achievement of political man.

For the democracy which has ended is not, of course, democracy "in general" or "in the abstract," but one particular, concrete form of democracy: namely, parliamentary democracy based upon capitalist property relations.

In 16th century England, bourgeois democracy began its stirring career. There parliament, in alliance with the King, fought the feudal lords; and. later, in the 17th century, breaking from the King, achieved supremacy through Cromwell's revolution. Parliamentary democracy was transferred to the United States, where it flourished. In France, it was established by the great revolution. In the 19th century it spread for a while until it seemed destined to supplant all other governmental systems: but long before its goal was reached, there could be seen the shadow of its early doom.

Bourgeois democracy was the form of government best suited to the young, vigorous and expanding capitalist nations. It permitted the maximum of freedom for the bourgeoisie: allowing them to throw off the shackles of feudalism, and at the same time to hold the masses in check. As capitalism reached imperialist maturity and old age, however, bourgeois democracy became a luxury that had to be discarded. After the last war, which marked the turning point into the final decline of capitalism, democracy could be afforded only by the rich, fat empires which could feed their democracy at home from the spoils of the colonies. The impoverished, desperate nations had to throw it aside, one after another.

Now, with the new war, it topples from the last remaining pedestals.

Fascism and Democracy Become Twins

The war has already, in a week, bridged the pretended "ultimate gulf" between fascist and democratic imperialism. The political and social regimes of Germany, France and England become identical in all essential aspects, merged into the war dictatorships. "Regimentation," censorship, abrogation of all civil and democratic rights win opposition. . . . Where is the meaningful difference?

Exactly the same thing will happen in the United States as it nears and enters the war. Indeed, complete plans for the totalitarian war dictatorship are all in readiness

But when the war is over, we are told, England and France and the United States will immediately return to their old democratic selves. Vain hope, vain and impossible! There can be no return.

There is no imperialist solution for this war. Whatever its outcome in a military sense, the social and economic chaos which has led to and, far more, will result from the war is of so colossal and profound a character that a recovery of "normal conditions," stability, security, is unthinkable. The problems and conflicts of the post-war crises will be even more shattering than those of the war itself. To suppose that these could be handled by the oldstyle bourgeois parliamentary governments is really laughable if it were not so fatal an illusion.

Parliamentary democracy might conceivably linger for a few years in one or two small and unimportant nations, off the beaten track of historybut even this is unlikely. For the decisive sections of the world, its day is over. Let us understand this. It is finished, done.

The Future of Democracy

Bourgeois democracy goes, and will not return. But the fate of democracy, of freedom and selfrule for the masses of the people, is not bound up with bourgeois parliamentary government. Indeed, bourgeois democracy was never more than a deception of the masses, the way in which the bourgeoisie enforced its rule over the people.

The end of bourgeois democracy means simply and clearly that the fate and future of democracy is bound up indissolubly with the overthrow of the rule of the bourgeoisie-who can no longer rule by democratic means, of their imperialism, of their war, and with the victory of the masses in the socialist revolution against the war. The only kind of democracy possible in the future is socialist democracy.

A war for democracy is well worth fighting! But it is not the war of Chamberlain, Hitler, Daladier and Roosevelt. The only war for democracy is the struggle against their war. Let this be remembered in the midst of the lies of the days to come!
